Source Of Your Drinking Water

Drinking water in Kirkwood comes from and is treated by the Missouri American Water Company, purchased by the City and redistributed to Kirkwood customers through City mains. This water that is purchased from Missouri American originates from the Missouri River.

Source Water Assessment

The Department of Natural Resources conducted a source water assessment to determine the susceptibility of our water source to potential contaminants. This process involved the establishment of source water area delineations for each well or surface water intake, and then a contaminant inventory was performed within those delineated areas to assess potential threats to each source. maproom.missouri.edu/swipmaps/pwssid.htm. To access the maps for your water system, you will need the State-assigned identification code for the Missouri American Water Company, which is MO6010716. The Source Water Inventory Project maps and information sheets provide a foundation upon which a more comprehensive source water protection plan can be developed.

Kirkwood's Water Quality Report

As part of our ongoing quality assurance program, the Kirkwood Water has published this "report card" for our customers to use in evaluating the quality of their drinking water. This "Consumer Confidence Report" lists any detected substances found in the water as a result of testing, the concentration detected, and the maximum contaminate level (MCL) allowed for that substance, as established by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in compliance with the Safe Drinking Water Act and regulated by the Missouri Department of Natural Resources.

Why Are There Contaminants In The Water & Where Do They Come From?

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and groundwater wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturallyoccurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as
- agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.
- Organic Chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are byproducts of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, the Department of Natural Resources prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. Department of Health regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water that must provide the same protection for public health.

Special Health Information

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromized persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice from their health care providers about drinking water. The state has reduced monitoring requirements for certain contaminants to less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants are not expected to vary significantly from year to year. Records with a sample year more than one year old are still considered representative.

Definitions Of Terms Used In This Report

- MCLG: Maximum Contaminant Level Goal, or the level of a contaminant in drinking water where there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.
- MCL: Maximum Contaminant Level, or the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed
 in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible, using the best
 available treatment technology.
- AL: Action Level, or the concentration of a contaminant which, when exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements, which a water system must follow.
- 90th percentile: For lead and copper testing, 10% of test results are above this level and 90% are below this level.
- Range: Shows the lowest and highest levels found during a testing period; if only one sample was taken, then this number equals the Level Found.
- RAA: Running Annual Average, or the average of sample analytical results for samples taken during the previous four calendar quarters.

Abbreviations Used In This Report

- TTHM: Total Trihalomethanes (Chloroform, bromodichloromethane, dibromochloromethane, and bromoform) as a group.
- HAA5: Haloacetic Acids (mono-, di- ad tri-chloracetic acid, and mono- and dibormaocetic acid) as a group.
- ppb: parts per billion or micrograms per liter.
- ppm: parts per million or milligrams per liter.
