## Some Accomplishments Over the Past Year:

- We collaborated with the Kirkwood School District and Vianney High School to promote our annual essay contest for 11th graders, and 105 students participated. The winners were recognized by and received prizes from the Mayor at a City Council meeting. One winner read her essay on stage at the MLK Celebration to great applause.
- We worked with Kirkwood Public Library to promote an art exhibit for middle-school-aged Kirkwood residents. Winners were recognized for their creative work.
- We worked with former Police Chief Jack Plummer and current Police Chief Brian Murphy to develop a reporting process to ensure a policy of racial non-discrimination in interactions with the public. It tracks demographics, complaints, officer training and annual recertification, and data on vehicle stops.
- KHRC members participated in Equity Walks with the Kirkwood R-7 School District, to help reach the goal of equity for all groups in the school system.
- We have continued our outreach to and cooperation with other human rights agencies and groups in the region and the state.
  KHRC members have attended meetings of the regional cooperative organization of HRCs as well as the annual Missouri Commission on Human Rights conference.
