<u>Intersection Art Project</u> – Will Frank has been preparing a proposal for the intersection art project which he will present at the meeting.


New Business

A motion was made by Will Franks, seconded by Gary Hochberg for the Commission to pursue this project. Motion pass unanimously.

Photo Contest Subcommittee

February 12, 2020

The Photo Contest Subcommittee met at the Community Center at 10:00 a.m. Present were Deanna Stevenson, Laura Horton, Rick Duplissie and Jim Erwin. Unable to attend: Mark Braun.

The Subcommittee recommends that a Photo Contest be held for 2020. After considerable discussion, the Subcommittee recommends the following for 2020:

- 1. Tentative theme: "Faces and Places of Kirkwood" This would encourage contestants to include people in the photographs, subject to the photographers obtaining permission to use the photos in promotional and other materials as the Commission see fit. This would be a condition of entering the contest as it has been in the past. We believe this theme is broad enough to allow photographers considerable leeway in subjects but does limit it to something connected to the City. There was a belief that having people in the photographs would make them more usable for publicity purposes.
- 2. Entries would be made this year through the Entrythingy website, subject to confirmation of cost. It appears from information in its website that there is no cost to open a call and the only cost is \$2 per token (or per entry through the website.)
- 3. We can still have two categories -18 and Over and Under 18 but to encourage entries we will not charge an entry fee. (This may have to change depending upon the Entrythingy cost, which needs to be clarified with those on the Commission or Foundation who have used it in the past.)
 - 4. We can still award cash prizes, likely at previous levels.
- 5. The winning entries (First through Third Prizes and Honorable Mention) will be displayed in the Performing Arts Center for one year. If this is approved, arrangements will have to be made to replace the Photo Contest winners at the Art in the Station exhibit for September 2020.
 - 6. To make sure of consistency in display, we will frame the winning entries at our cost.
 - 7. If approved, the calls will be opened by March 15 and continue open to June 30.
- 8. Entries will be judged by an internal group consisting of the Photo Contest Subcommittee and possibly one or two others, with judging to be completed by July 10.
- 9. The winners will be hung on July 23. For the ceremony, we would temporarily display the highest ranked photo from each entrant.
- 10. Winners would be recognized at a "soft opening" of the Performing Arts Center on the evening of Friday, July 24. The proposed Grand Opening is August 1.

- 11. We expect the cost not to exceed prior contest budgets and, with anticipated cost savings, it *may* be less. We will prepare a tentative budget by the next Commission meeting.
- 12. For the future, the Subcommittee will explore the possibility of developing an internal mechanism for receiving entries that would give us more control and save money.






Jan Kaláb, a graffiti pioneer in his native Czech Republic made his name on the European art scene originally under the name Cakes in the late 90s.


After establishing himself on the Old Continent he ventured to the graffiti Hall of fame: New York, where he collaborated on numerous projects with the kings of the graffiti scene at the time - Key and Rome.

Around the same time, he found a new way to push his own limits and challenge himself by making 3-D Graffiti. Under the name of Point, he sculpted huge abstracts letters he chose to put in the streets and on the walls. The highest the better. This was another form of graffiti, in daylight, and without a spray, but truthful to the spirit of competition and innovation of the urban scene.

Those sculptures lead him to abstraction, a path he's been exploring through canvas from 2007, using acrylic painting and brushes. In the meantime, this admirer of Kupka graduated from the Academy of fine Arts of Prague – becoming the first Czech writer to do so. Jan Kaláb had his first solo exhibition in 2008 in Prague. Others solos took place in Romania, Argentina, Germany or in the United States. With time, his forms became more and more geometric.

He has been using colorful squares and circles as an obsessive vocabulary for infinite variations around depth, time, and motion. Playing with circles conveyed organic imperfection and swing into his work. Dynamic is also crucial in his recent experiments, when he took pictures of some of his paintings in the streets of New York or other cities. The project became a social one when he realized he needed help from strangers to carry the canvas. This is no surprise, since collective energy is crucial in his creative process. The artist is very invested in collective events. He's the co-creator of a highly dynamic cultural space in Prague, called Trafačka. More than 160 exhibitions took place there from the opening in 2006 till the closure in 2015. On his own or collectively, the motto is the same: always getting higher, always inventing new forms — a tribute to the soul of graffiti.


