TREE TALK

We like to think of trees as tall, stately, benevolent giants, quietly providing shelter, shade, and oxygen, season by season, decade by decade. Their very sturdiness makes them seem invulnerable. Drought, disease, severe weather, and pests can prove to be very dangerous to these important assets.

A fungal disease that has been appearing in Kirkwood is the Sycamore Anthracnose. This fungal disease infects sycamore trees and is usually not fatal, but disfigures and weakens the tree, leaving it susceptible to other diseases or pests. It is common in the cool, wet weather of Spring and causes new leaves to turn brown and drop off. The tree may develop cankers resulting in twig dieback and death of larger branches. Clusters of dead twigs will result in abnormal, sometimes twisted branching. Raking up and properly disposing of fallen leaves and twigs can help prevent spread of the fungus. Pruning will also help, but disinfect the pruning shears with a 10% bleach solution to prevent spread. Pruning is an important tool for managing the health of trees. The City utilizes an eight year cycle to trim trees in the public right-ofway. Trees are pruned for shape, health of the tree, clearance, and to remove dead or unhealthy limbs. Trees that have been pruned are healthier and are less affected by severe storms, dropping fewer limbs in high winds, which means safer roadways/sidewalks and fewer power outages.
