

CITY OF KIRKWOOD GRANT'S TRAIL COMMUNITY SURVEY SUMMARY



ABOUT THE RESPONDENTS




- Almost all (96%) have visited Grant's Trail. 79% have visited in the last six months
- A good mix of residents and non-residents took the survey. 65% of respondents reported they live in zip code 63122. 35% live elsewhere.
- Age and gender of respondents were similar to Census figures for Kirkwood.
 Race of respondents was more likely to be White and less likely to be African-American compared to Census.

ABOUT THE TRAIL



- Top uses identified for the trail were cycling (82%), walking (54%), and running (30%).
- Top destinations by a significant amount, were shops and restaurants in Downtown Kirkwood (78%) and the Kirkwood Farmer's Market (73%).










- Amenities desired by more than 50% of respondents include: Restrooms (61%), Trash Cans (60%), and Benches and Drinking Fountains (both 52%).
- Top safety concerns were interactions with motor vehicles (63%) and crossings at railroad tracks (31%). About a fourth (26%) said they did not have any safety concerns.







- A significant majority (87%) said the vision was on the right track. There were several comments
 regarding safety. Suggestion to add the word "safe" to the vision statement.
- Most goals received similar levels of support. Two goals received less support than others "Encourage
 economic development" and "Provide facilities that encourage trail usage by users from around the
 region."
